Avoid the most common mistakes when making or updating your Will in NSW

Having a valid Will isn't just about writing down your wishes. NSW law sets strict rules for how a Will must be signed, witnessed, and stored. Even small errors (like removing a staple) can create confusion or legal problems when your loved ones need clarity most.

Use this quick checklist before you sign, and give yourself peace of mind.

| | Two independent witnesses: Choose adults who aren't beneficiaries or their spouses. |
| | Sign together: The person making the will signs (or confirms their signature) and both witnesses sign in the will-maker's presence, all in one go. |
| | No handwritten changes: Don't scribble on your will. If you need to update it, make a formal amendment (called a codicil) or write a new will. |
| | Keep it clean and safe: Don't remove staples or add marks. Store the original flat and secure. |
| | Update after life changes: Marriage, separation/divorce, new children, or property changes may require updates. |
| | Remote witnessing rules: If using video witnessing in NSW, follow the legal steps exactly (real-time video, correct wording, originals handled properly). |
